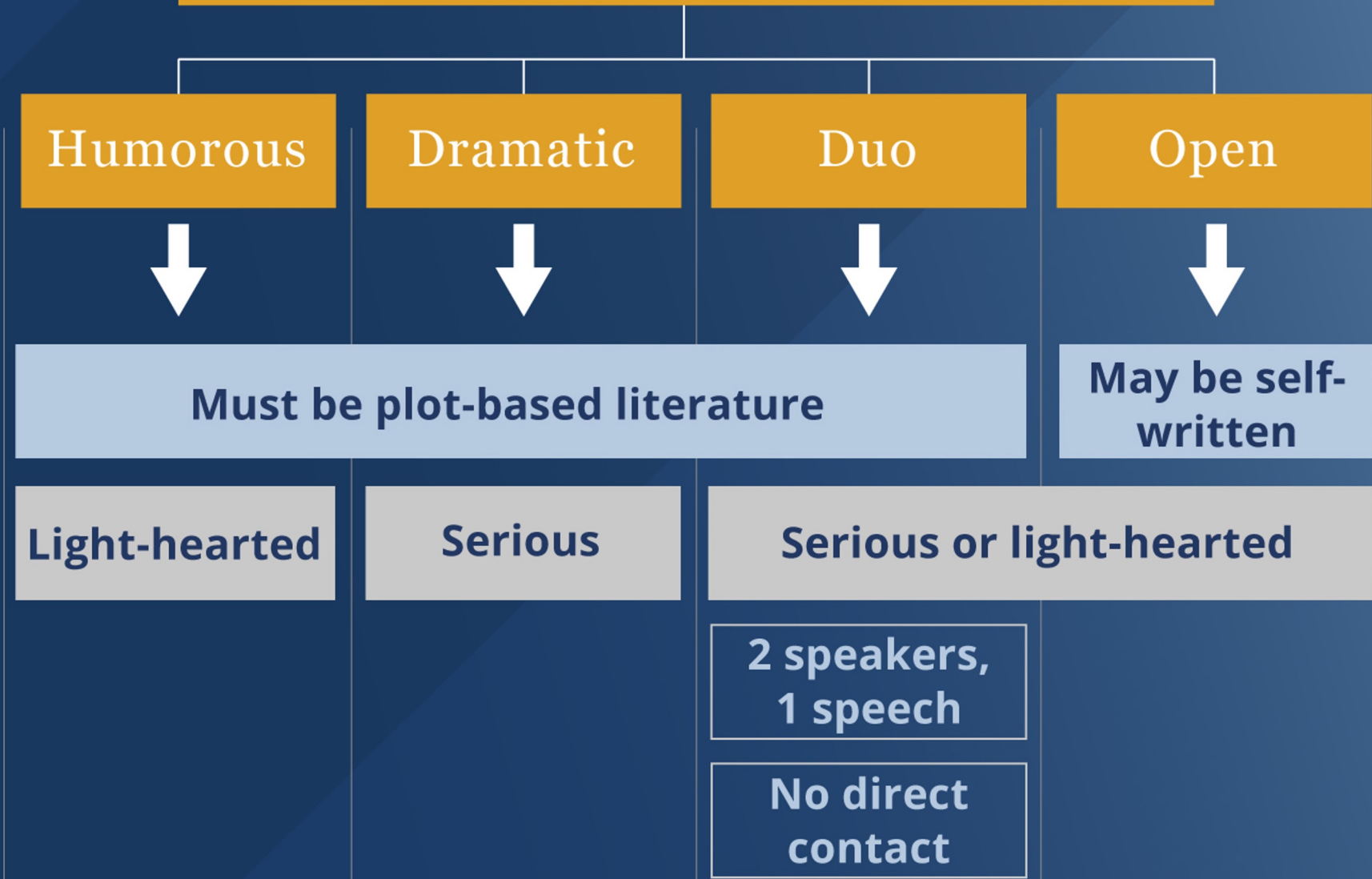

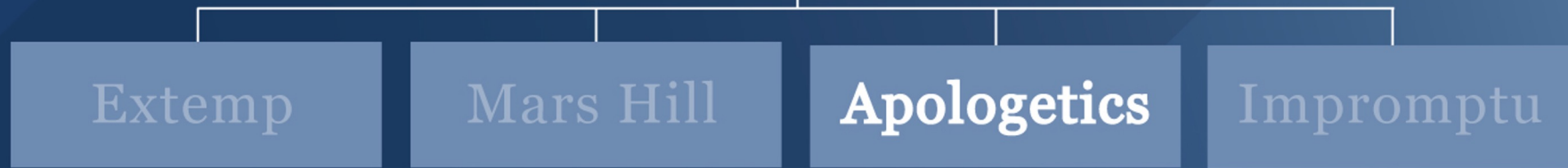

- Judges should be in agreement with the **Stoa Statement of Faith**. *Copy available at end of slides.*
